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### 1. Important Air Quality Information

Fairfax County and Northern Virginia are part of the metropolitan area designated by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as not meeting the federal standard for ozone. One of the major contributors to ozone formation is vehicle exhaust. The exhaust contains carbon monoxide, carbon dioxide, particulate matter, volatile organic matter, and more than 21 kinds of air toxins, which, by definition, are hazardous to human health.

You can help improve our air quality and lower the amount of ozone formed during ozone season, from April through October. An easy way to do this is to not let your car idle for more than 30 seconds

after you reach your destination. Unnecessary engine idling can be a significant source of air pollution, particularly for people near the vehicle. The best example of this is when you're waiting to pick your child up from school. The EPA has performed tests and determined that cars burn more fuel and create more exhaust emissions from idling over 30 seconds than if you turn your car off and restart it. You can follow this same practice when waiting at a drive-in bank, restaurant, etc.

Air pollution affects the health of everyone. The average person breathes 35 pounds of air a day. Children are even more at risk because they breathe faster than adults. In addition to health effects, vehicle exhaust emissions contribute to environmental damage such as smog, global warming, and acid rain. Everyone can make a difference, and together we can improve the air quality in our community.

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## 6. Fairgrade Information

FAIRGRADE is a parent-driven research/advocacy group that was created in January 2008.

Its origins began with a December 2007 Washington Post article that highlighted the disparities between Fairfax and Montgomery County grading policies. After months of research, FAIRGRADE has determined that the differences in these grading policies put FCPS students at a disadvantage with respect to college admissions and impact our students' opportunities for merit scholarships, Honors programs, NCAA athletic eligibility, and car insurance "good-driver" discounts.

In the last month, FAIRGRADE has presented its research findings to over 300 parents at McLean High School and Langley High School. Audience members quickly contacted Superintendent Dale and School Board members and requested that FCPS revise its existing grading policies to be more in line with other nationally recognized public high schools. In addition, both Langley and McLean

PTSAs have voted to publicly endorse FAIRGRADE's recommendation that both the FCPS grading scale and weighting policies for Honors and AP courses be revised.

Compared to 45 nationally recognized school districts, Fairfax County has punitive and unfair grading policies. In the last three years, 15 other school districts, which previously used a tougher grading scale, have determined that it hurt students and have switched to the standard 10 Point Grading scale. Adopting a 10 Point Grading Scale and increasing the weight for Honors and AP courses will benefit FCPS students. It will encourage students to take more challenging courses, and it will allow students to receive the fair grades they deserve.
