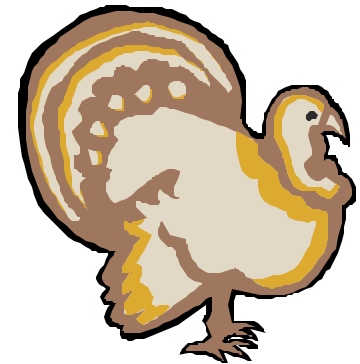
Parents. The Anti-Drug

Notes From the Mantua Principals' Office

Mantua Elementary has been following the priorities of Ernest Boyer's Basic School philosophy since 1997. The term "basic" is used because it gives priority to the early years of a child's education focusing on literacy development, essential knowledge, and identifying best practices that really work in the education of elementary-age students. The Boyer approach employs four priorities: *The School as a Community, A Curriculum with Coherence, A Climate for Learning, and A Commitment to Character.*

Last year, we began to investigate how schools can and should become "Professional Learning Communities" (PLC). As we learned more about PLC, we realized that in our journey with the Boyer philosophy we have many of its features already in place here at Mantua. Our school has a clear mission and vision and has been working in collaborative grade level teams for many years. Teachers serve as leaders as they mentor new teachers, lead cross-grade level teams, and present their ideas at conferences. Parents have been working as partners with our school through their support at home and their numerous volunteer efforts with activities such as the Bag of Books Program and Math Happenings.

The piece missing from the Boyer philosophy was related to ensuring that all students were learning. Using guidelines from PLC, we are excited to develop critical curriculum goals for each grade level and assessments that will allow students to demonstrate understanding of these concepts. Related to these assessments are four questions that teams will be constantly asking in relation to student learning: What do we want students to learn? How will we know if they have learned it? What are we going to do if they do not learn it? What are we going to do if they have already learned it? These questions are based on our belief that all children can learn tying in beautifully with the shared vision of the Basic School, which is excellence for all.

As we move forward with the Boyer philosophy while incorporating the practices that help us to function as a Professional Learning Community, you may be asking what role do parents have in this journey. Parents as partners in their child's learning need to continue to model life-long learning. During the evening hours, rather than asking your child what **they** learned at school today, we encourage **you** to share an anecdote about something you learned today. Children are fascinated that their parents still learn. In one school that functions as a community of learners, parents report this to be the most influential form of involvement available to them for stimulating their child's learning in school (Barth, 2001).

News from the Energy Zone The rise in overweight children means that parents need to take an active role in providing healthy snacks for their children. The Fairfax County Office of Food & Nutrition Services offer these healthy snacking tips:

Keeps snacks small.

Don't eat snacks straight out of the package.

Limit snacks such as brownies and cookies because they are often loaded with calories and sugar.

Snack on fruits and vegetables.

Select snacks from the Food Guide Pyramid.

Quench your thirst with water, fruit juices or milk, not soda pop.

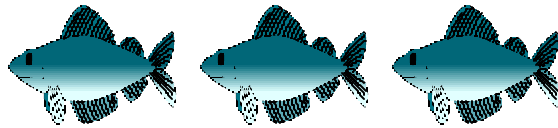
Read food labels carefully—if first ingredient is sugar **avoid it.**

Counselor's Corner

The counselors have completed their lessons on Bullying and Harassment with grades K-6. If you know of bullying problems that are not "going away," please let us know so that we can address them right away. This month, the K-3 students will be learning about other ways to avoid and deflect teasing. We will use the example of fishing "hooks" (teases) and what to do to so you will not get "hooked." Some of the techniques include: not reacting, agreeing with the tease, changing the subject, making a joke, and staying away from the teaser. The students in grades 4-6 will be exploring good communication skills, including: listening with full attention, understanding what is said as well as the feelings that are being communicated, and responding in appropriate ways.
