Even though children seem to be growing up, parents have to find a way to juggle the increased need for independence and the continued need for guidance, support, and communication. Summertime is a great season for getting to do many things that there is not enough time or opportunity for, during the school year. This is a great time for families to spend more time together. Since there is no required homework, the evenings should be more relaxed, with chances for family activities. There is usually better weather and more daylight for outdoor activities and exercise. Beware of TV, videogames, and computer time. Many families decide to limit these things by giving time allotments during the day or week. It is wonderful when children also have additional time to just play with each other outside, or visit at each others' houses.

At the same time, it will help the children in the long run, to keep up their academic skills, as well as their love of learning new things, if they have some "food for thought" over the summer months. °₹ ₩ Reading skills are kept up to date and improved by encouraging lots of reading over the summer. Many Ŵ libraries have programs that encourage children to read lots of books and receive reward coupons at the Ŵ end of the summer. Children's magazines and newspapers are also of interest to many kids. Ŵ Some families use a reward system for encouraging their children to keep up on math skills, by 1 rewarding time with flash cards, or doing math problems, with points which can be used to get some Ŵ reward at the end of each week. Older children who need to improve their keyboarding/typing skills can °N M also be encouraged in this way, e.g., by receiving a point for each 15 minutes that they use a "type to learn" program. Rewards do not have to be expensive, but should be things that you know your child really likes (and will work for). These can be things you were already planning to do or give to your E C children anyway, like trips to the park, or to the ice cream store.

We have really enjoyed working with your children this year, and look forward to more time with them in the new school year!
